History of Letterpress with Robert LoMascolo

Robert LoMascolo, proprietor of his <u>own press</u> in Aurora, and Lecturer at Wells College will speak on the history of letterpress printing, it's relation to the museum's collection, and its relevance to today. Robert will bring a small vintage printing press for a hands-on demonstration at the end of the talk.

Robert LoMascolo established The Press of Robert LoMascolo while studying Book Arts at Wells College in 2005. After graduating from Wells, Robert went on to complete a master's degree in Book Arts at The University of Alabama. After Alabama, Robert decided to return to the Finger Lakes and began collecting and restoring antique printing presses, eventually opening a purpose-built antique print shop on Moonshine Road in Aurora. Robert has an international array of clients for his bookbinding, graphic

design and printing work. His clients have included The Frick Collection, Princeton University, Suntup Editions and the Bodleian to name a few. Additionally, Robert teaches college level Book Arts courses at Wells College and occasionally offers workshops at his own shop.

COLLECTIONS



Our 1917 "Street Banner" from the campaign for passage of Amendment was recently conserved by Spicer Art Conservation and is now hung in the second floor Gallery at Opendore.

The conservation of (this work) was supported through the NYSCA/GHHN Conservation Treatment Grant Program administered by Greater Hudson Heritage Network. This program is made possible by the New York State Council on the Arts with support of the Office of the Governor and the New York State Legislature.



Recently we completed the move of archive boxes from the Stone Store to the Opendore Archive Room, fulfilling a long-term goal of having these historic materials in a proper environment. The boxes contain a fascinating array of materials from the 19th century, including financial records from Slocum's enterprises as well as letters, photos, and other paper materials.

FACILITIES

The reconstructed Springhouse behind Opendore is now completed and was dedicated on August 27. The 12ft x 12ft brick masonry structure was badly deteriorated and in 2016 the pyramidal wood roof was removed to prevent collapse. Portions were salvaged for restoration or reproduction, including the ornamental wood outlookers on the rafters and the peaked removable center hatch.

In the fall of 2022 mason Steve Buller restored the brick walls using brick salvaged from the Opendore chimneys that were dismantled. New frames for the arched window and door opening were installed. Over the winter of 2012-23 the wood framing was reproduced, and the historic hatch carefully restored by volunteers. In the spring and summer of 2023, the elaborate wood roof framing was carefully reconstructed, matching the pyramid shape of the original. Wood rafters and decking salvaged from the Opendore Carriage House was used. New shingles and trim completed the restoration.

HISTORIAN

Jethro Wood, the brother-in-law of Slocum Howland, has been called by some "The Father of the Modern Plow." His was the first plow in which the parts most exposed to wear could be renewed in the field by the substitution of new parts. It revolutionized the industry, and he and Slocum were partners in manufacturing and shipping of the plow. Jethro Wood, however, never enjoyed the financial fruits of his invention. HAZARD LIBRARY ADDITION OPENDORE

We continue our planning with the library for an addition on the south side of Opendore to house library space. Hazard Library and Howland Stone Store Museum have recently executed a long-term agreement for lease of the ground space for the addition, which will be designed, constructed, and operated by the Library. The library has retained Holmes – King - Kallquist Architects for design of the facility, and Schematic Drawings have been prepared. Further design will follow this and next year.
