MUSEUM HOURS



This year the Stone Store Museum is open **Fridays and Saturdays** from 1:00 to 4:00 PM, starting in June. Additional hours can be arranged by appointment by contacting Barb Taylor 607-592-5649.



DOCENTS NEEDED: Our museum operation for the public depends on our volunteer docents. This year we have a script that can be followed to make docenting easier. It follows the lives and activities of Slocum, William, Hannah, Emily and Benjamin and Isabel Howland. We train our docents, and a new docent is always paired with someone experienced. Docenting is an opportunity to learn history of Sherwood and the Howlands; and an opportunity to meet folks from near and far. COLLECTIONS:

Our records of our collections are mostly hand-written or typed in programs like "Word." Because they are not in a professional database, they can't be searched; pages of lists and references must be examined individually by a museum volunteer. This is very slow, subject to error, and extremely frustrating. We have begun a computerization process, and one of our goals is to extend that to all our holdings, starting with an in-house computer and building on what we have done. This is a very large project, but basic to the safety and usefulness of our collections.

Elsie Gutchess, a long-time supporter of the HSSM, gave the Museum her large collection of materials on women in America. It includes articles and pictures and artifacts on many aspects of women's life. Much of that collection is being digitized via a grant written and implemented by the Wells College library. Tiffany Raymond, Assistant Director of the Wells Library, is in charge of the project, with Wells students using their large scanner and related technology. Wells has offered to include some of our materials, especially related to Emily Howland and women's suffrage, in the grant proposal for next year. Several of our volunteers met with Tiffany to discuss how this could be implemented; we are looking forward to this project.

Some of our behind-the-scenes work slows in the summer, but Museum volunteers are busy with our collection as we docent for our visitors. Some come with special questions, perhaps about family. Others are particularly interested in our poster collection or our Underground Railroad ticket. The Cabinet of Curiosities is always one of the most popular parts of the Museum, along with our piece of Susan B. Anthony's birthday cake.

Email can also bring requests for information or offers to share. A recent example relates to Emily Howland's major contributions in building and supporting schools for freed slaves after the Civil War. We have records of some of her financial contributions and also pictures of her visiting some of those schools. Recently we were contacted by the Bettis Academy in Trenton, South Carolina, looking for information and offering us some material. We have the record that she included the Academy in her will (along with dozens of other schools including Tuskegee Institute) and a note in her handwriting, dated October 23, 1926, in which she refers to having been a trustee in various schools, including the Bettis Academy. We will continue to follow up on this and other requests for information.

PROGRAMS:



This July Larry Bell presented at Genesee Country Museum on Emily Howland and her work during the civil war in the South. This program will also be presented this November at HSSM (see below).

OPENDORE PROJECT:

Our work this summer has been focused on interior finishes. Pinnacle Builders of Oswego has completed installation of drywall ceiling and walls, a major step forward in the building's completion. Since then volunteers have painted the surfaces, giving the rooms a very "finished" look. Currently we're anticipating installation of hardwood floors throughout the building under a contract.

There is a great deal of interior trim to be restored or reproduced to recreate the historic building finishes. If you have carpentry skills, we could use the expertise!

Since the October 2016 start of volunteer construction on the West Wing and continuing thru exterior refurbishment and interior renovation, <u>over 5,200 volunteer hours</u> have been donated by a dedicated core of individuals.
